September lurks around the corner with a whole new cycle of temple openings, beginnings, and a calendar full of services and events.

At the temple, we have a hopeful anticipation of trying to provide live services once again. September 19 Fall Ohigan Service is our target, so August is the time for our temple leaders to consider the pro's and con's, and to view all our options. ARIGATAI (appreciative). Through virtual and ZOOM services and sessions, we have successfully been able to reach out to more people and further locations than ever before. We want to maintain these connections as another arm of our temple outreach efforts. Meetings are easier to attend. Classes are manageable options to work into our busy schedules. There are good aspects that have risen out of the pandemic difficulties of the past year and a half. We want to be able to

maintain what we have learned, manage what we have gained, and return safely to all we hold dear at the temple. Again, please be patient.

I will be away on vacation time this month, so there will be no video services provided on the last 3 Sundays of August. I will be nearby and accessible, so please feel free to contact me for questions or family situations. See you at the temple.

2021 Obon/Hatsubon Services

The temple conducted Obon/Hatsubon services on the evening of July 17 and the morning of July 18, 2021. We haven't yet fully re-opened, so conducting two *in person* services at the temple still allowed for safe spacing.

Participants first gathered in the social hall. Mr. Hiko Shimamoto chaired both the Saturday evening and Sunday morning services. Reverend Fujimoto introduced a new different format for the service. Rev. Dennis greeted everyone and explained the new procedures. While Rev. Dennis chanted in the hondo, participants would move out to the garden, slowly meditatively walk around the pond to a series of small lighted altars where they recited a brief passage from a sutra or poem. Ushers guided the participants when necessary. The path ended in front of the temple's main entrance. Participants entered the Honda and when all were seated, the services began.





Rennyo Shōnin is revered for his great achievement as the "Second Founder" in the eight hundred year history of the Hongwanji.

When he became a spiritual head of the Hongwanji, Japan was developing economically, and a new social structure was forming during the Warring period. It was a period of internal warfare and people were facing social turmoil.

Rennyo transmitted, in an easily understood manner, the path of being spiritually liberated according to Amida Buddha's deep wish, and the nembutsu taught by the Founder Shinran Shōnin.

Because of Rennyo's energetic propagation carried on through his life, the teaching of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism spread throughout the country and became the foundation for the Hongwanji today.

In this seminar, we will learn about the life of Rennyo and his propagation methods, which may provide some hints to the American Shinshū community today.



Rev. Dr. Mutsumi Wondra serves as a BCA minister at the Orange County Buddhist Church and adjunct professor at the IBS. She received Tokudo (2006) and Kyoshi (2007) ordination from Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha. She earned an MA from the Institute of Buddhist Studies: and MA and PhD from Ryukoku University Graduate School of Shin Buddhist Studies; and Hongwanji-ha Hokyo.
