Message from Rev. D.

HOONKO

Darker mornings and shorter days tell us that the fall season is closing its door. We hurry through the day to make sure we have enough sun light to finish our projects and errands. Appreciative of what we get, we thank the sun and go inside. It's time to place stew on the menu.

November brings us the annual HOONKO Service. HOONKO is the most important service on our Jodo Shinshu calendar. We recognize the death memorial of our founder, Shinran Shonin. Here at our temple, and at some of the other BCA temples, we recognize November 28 as the day of Shinran's passing. This follows the lunar calendar and the Higashi Hongwanji tradition.

Most of our Buddhist Churches of America temples observe this service in January, with January 16, 1263 being the recognized day of

Shinran Shonin's death. This change of date occurred in 1872 when our mother temple, Nishi Hongwanji, changed to the western calendar, setting the HOONKO date at January 16. It is for this reason that the monthly memorial morning service for Shinran Shonin observed at some of our temples, the Gomeinichi Service, is observed on the morning of the16th of each month.

Whatever date we have come to recognize, the importance of HOONKO is for each of us to reflect upon the life of Shinran Shonin. We are reminded to deepen our own appreciation of the Nembutsu path that has grown to mean so much to millions of fellow travelers throughout the world. The temple is much more than teriyaki, sushi and social activities. The temple is not just a personal country club. We are provided a path of depth, awareness, and appreciation. Each of our lives becomes deeper and fuller as we recite Namo Amida Butsu and live the life of Nembutsu. We find that compassion is received in endless manifestations, everywhere we turn.

We are touched by the life and effort of Shinran Shonin in a very real way. A grassroots Buddhism was born, as he brought the Nembutsu path to the peasants ... farmers, fishermen, merchants ... people who worked hard every day. These are our people. These are you and me. These are our parents and grandparents who worked with dirt under their fingernails and sweat on their brows to make a living. We have followed in their footsteps to our lives here and now. They have brought forward the Nembutsu path for us, and we owe them a debt of gratitude and to pay attention to what's been left to us all.

Those new to this life of Nembutsu find a pleasant discovery of a path of Dharma in everyday activity. The Sangha members are our fellow travelers along the path who offer kindness and support. Together we maintain the temple so that others can also encounter the Buddha. Here we find grounded stability to help ourselves and to extend it to others.

The **HOONKO Service** this year will be held **November 20, at 10:00 AM in Alameda** and 2:00 PM at Enmanji. We'll see you at the temple.

FBWA Virtual Conference & Representatives' Meeting: Fri.-Sun. – Oct. 14-16 The virtual conference entitled, "Winds of Change" was held via Zoom and hosted by the Northern California District. It was very well organized and inspirational. Following the theme of "change" there were several presentations focusing on the future of the BWA and our temples. From the panel discussions of young female BCA ministers and ministers assistants to interviews with college-age temple members, it was very insightful and gave many of us hope for the future. There was a variety of workshops including one on card-making as well as a Japanese cooking demonstration, and a talk on Global Citizenship Education "Compassion in Action" in making our Shin teachings relevant to our youth.

Dr. Paula Arai, the newly hired IBS Eshinni Kakushinni Professor of Women and Buddhist Studies, in her public lecture, gave some interesting perspectives on Eshinni and Kakushinni. There were responses by three other female Buddhist scholars. To hear about the early Jodo Shinshu women "pioneers," their strength and resilience, was very thought-provoking. And, to hear about them from the voices of these women today was very impactful!

There was also the presentation of the new gatha, "With Gassho from the Heart" that was composed by Donna Sasaki and the BCA Music Committee. It was sponsored by the BCA FBWA for the 2023 World Buddhist Women's Convention in Kyoto. It will include a video presentation. As requested, we have submitted photos from our Alameda BWA to be included in the video, so hopefully, we will see at least one of them in the final video! It's a beautiful gatha, but it will take some practice to become familiar with it!

IMOP MINISTERS VISIT OUR TEMPLE!!!


