## Message from Rev. D.

#### Fall Ohigan 2022

We look forward to moving on from the summer heat. Signals are calling out the seasonal change that is just around the corner. Soon the **Fall Equinox** will be here with the balance of day and night. Even our own bodies will be permeated with the harmony flowing throughout the universe.

The Equinox happens twice each year during the Fall and Spring seasons. The usually mild and pleasant weather has long been recognized as an ideal time for study, meditation, and reflection. It is at this time that we hold our Ohigan Service twice each year.

Higan, meaning the Other Shore, calls for us to bring our attention to what is beyond this shore ... our normal life of self-concern and personal accomplishments. The Other Shore comes into view as awareness of the countless causes and conditions, and the



interdependence of all things grows in each of us. In comparison the normal view that we are accustomed to is revealed to be a small, limited, and narrow view of life. With this new awareness and a broader perspective, we begin to move beyond what was once normal towards a deeper and fuller life ... towards the Other Shore.

The 6 Paramitas are provided as guides to move towards the Other Shore. Each Ohigan we are reminded of the 6 Paramitas as Dana – Selfless Giving, Sila – Ethics, Ksanti – Perseverence, Virya – Diligence, Dhyana – Meditation, and Prajna - Wisdom. In our Shin Buddhist tradition, the 6 Paramitas and all practices are contained in the Nembutsu. As we earnestly recite the Nembutsu, the process of awakening and moving towards the Other Shore begins to take effect. The Nembutsu is sometimes described as the Call of the Infinite or the Voice of Reality. It calls from the Other Shore for us to move in that direction and beyond our limitations of self and ego.

Ohigan is always a refreshing time to renew our efforts and to re-evaluate our priorities. Those new to the ways of the temple can come to appreciate even more that the Shin Buddhist path is a common sense approach to spirituality. Compassion is balanced with Wisdom, and gratitude for life emerges out of truths recognizable by all. Those long connected to the temple can recognize once again that the Dharma and the Nembutsu path enrich our lives as individuals, family, and community. Continued support in various ways becomes our heartfelt manner to thank those before us and to share this path with the next to arrive.

This year the Ohigan Service will take place September 25 at 10:00 AM. The service will be live in Alameda, and virtual or recorded at both Alameda and Enmanji. We'll see you there or on the screen!




## Classes will be held from 7:00 PM – 8:30 PM on October 6, 13, 20, 27, 2022
