### Message from Rev. D.

### September Article 2023

We look forward to moving on from the summer heat. Signals are calling out the seasonal change that is just around the corner. Soon the **Fall Equinox** will be here with the balance of day and night. The Equinox happens twice each year during the Fall and Spring seasons. The usually mild and pleasant weather has long been recognized as an ideal time for study, meditation, and reflection. At our Shin Buddhist Temples, the time of the Equinox is recognized as **Ohigan**, observed twice each year.



Personally, I look forward to the Fall Ohigan because Sharmon and I were married on Ohigan Sunday 14 years ago. 09 20 2009. It was the busiest day ever! Bishop Ogui was our temple guest for the weekend. He spoke at the local college on Saturday and then met with our Sangha group (Howakai) in Boise, then back to the temple for a welcome dinner. Then early Sunday, we held a special Kieshiki Ceremony with a group of about 20 members who received their Homyo (Buddhist Name) from the Bishop. Then we had our Ohigan Service with many in attendance. They had come because each Fall Ohigan we held our temple scholarship luncheon with lasagna, salad, French bread, and dessert cooked and served by the Dharma School students, parents, Sharmon and myself. THEN, after all that, we had our wedding with Bishop Ogui officiating. Family and friends mixed with the Sangha. Members didn't know whether they were coming or going ... table clothes were put up, then taken down, then put up again in a different color! Sharmon was stressed and ended up with shinales that have not gone away to this day, and I'm the reason why!!! We don't want to recreate the weekend, but it is a nice memory in retrospect.

When we do come to the time of Ohigan, I do look forward to it not only for personal memories, but the time for settled reflection and introspection can unfold into a state of awareness. Beyond thinking about what it means and what we do and where it came from, the actuality of balance and harmony in nature permeates each of us. It is probably healthy and beneficial to have at least this degree of awareness of self in relation and connection to all that surrounds us.

### CONT. REV. D's MESSAGE

The time of the equinox is not a weeklong period, but actually a specific point in time when the sun crosses the equator. It is at that point when both the Northern and Southern hemispheres aet the same amount of sun, and the length of day and night are equal. Light and dark are balanced. During Ohigan, we are encouraged to enjoy and appreciate this balance a few days before and a few days after the moment of the equinox. Many cultures and religions celebrate this time of year all over the world. Festivals and food mark the change in seasons with hopes and promise of what is to come.

Ohigan is always a refreshing time to renew our efforts and to re-evaluate our priorities. Those new to the ways of the temple can come to appreciate even more that the Shin Buddhist path is a common sense approach to spirituality. Compassion is balanced with Wisdom, and gratitude for life emerges out of truths recognizable by all. Those long connected to the temple can recognize once again that the Dharma and the Nembutsu path enrich our lives as individuals, family, and community. Continued support in various ways becomes our heartfelt manner to thank those before us and to share this path with the next to arrive.

This year the **Ohigan Service** will take place September 17 in Alameda at 10:00 AM. We'll see you at the temple.
