Message from Rev. D.

2024 BWA & Ladies of the Dharma Memorial Service ESHINNI and KAKUSHINNI - October brings us our BWA Memorial Service when we acknowledge the members we have lost since the service last year. We are able to appreciate them with Gassho, Nembutsu, and Thank You for the many ways they helped and guided the ways of the temple, and for being our friends. We also honor Eshinni, Kakushinni, Lady Yoshiko Ohtani, and Lady Takeko Kujo. We name them our Ladies of the Dharma, for their



very important contributions to our Jodo Shinshu traditions. Each provide example of the life of a Buddhist and our shared Nembutsu path. Of course, it was Eshinni and Kakushinni who were the earliest women of our tradition.

Eshinni, the wife of Shinran Shonin, and Kakushinni, their daughter, each played significant roles in the history of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism. In some corners there were those who questioned whether Shinran himself was an actual historical figure until **the Letters of Eshinni** were found in the Hongwanji archives in 1921. These 10 letters were written to her youngest daughter, Kakushinni, who lived in Kyoto with Shinran.

Through these letters we are able to glimpse a personal account of the conditions of the times. Shinran's own process of coming to terms with the Nembutsu teachings is reflected in the letters. The depth of Eshinni's understanding and awareness of the Nembutsu path sheds light upon the relationship between her and Shinran. Just as he taught his followers, he would have shared the teachings with his wife Eshinni as well.

Kakushinni cared for her father until his death. Shinran was cremated the next day, and Kakushinni ordered a tombstone to be placed to mark his grave. This was to become the beginning of the Hongwanji, the mother temple of our Shin Buddhist tradition.

It is mind boggling to think that these letters were found so recently. They were carefully kept in storage and even moved from location to location as the Hongwanji grew and changed and moved through history. Yet somehow, they were hidden through all of this. Amazing, but not that amazing. Look at our own boxes full of stuff that sit on shelves unopened through decades and generations at our own temples and homes. Who knows what valuable treasures we still have hidden in the attic or basement.

CONT. REV. D's MESSAGE

It is common for us to know most of our temple ministers as having wife and family. Those new to our tradition might be surprised to learn that Shinran was the first monk in the Buddhist tradition to openly take a wife. He also broke away from the restriction of eating meat that had been the norm of monastic practice. These changes opened a path in Buddhism that is geared towards the common people. The Nembutsu path is a grass roots movement of Buddhism available to all and not aimed towards the elite of privileged life and to those of royal status. It is everyday Buddhism for everyday people.

It was the common people ... the farmers, fishermen, merchants and peasants who found the Nembutsu path most fitting for them. It was also these same common people who would leave Japan to find a new life for themselves as immigrants. The first Japanese to settle in America were from areas in Japan that were predominantly Shin Buddhist communities. It is part of their legacy to leave the temples and the teachings for us to continue.

This year our **BWA Memorial**Service will be October 15, 2023. Please plan to attend this very special service. A special Guest Speaker will be joining us that day. Please check the website or newsletter for details. We will see you at the temple.


Next Meeting:
