A NEW YEAR!!

AKEMASHITE OMETOU GOZAIMASU!! Welcome to 2026! It feels strange to even write such a number! Each year we go through the shock of writing the new number even though the reflection in the mirror has been telling us all along that another day has gone by. "All things change" are the words of the truth of impermanence. How is it that we are still surprised??

This year will be **The Year of the Horse** according to the Chinese zodiac. I notice all the more since we have one in the family! Shadow will take her place of prominence and make sure we know that this will be HER YEAR! We should make her a Horse Onenju to remind her to be humble and kind along with the rest of us. Did I tell you that the horse across the way from Shadow is named Sensei? When her people come, they are all saying, "Hi, Sensei!" "Hi, Sensei!" It takes me a second to realize that they aren't talking to me.



We are told that 2026 is specifically the year of the **Fire Horse**. We will see images of red horses, conveying the **qualities of energy, passion, and bold action**. Each Sunday in January seems to have special elements for all of us to enjoy. **January 4 is our Shotsuki Service. January 11 is our All Beings Memorial**, when we can reflect upon the pets we have had and lost, as well as all forms of life, animal and other, who have touched and impacted our lives. Our Guest Speaker that day will be Ms Yumi Yasuda!! It is our BTOA tradition to have had lay speakers for many years for this service here in Alameda. This year Yumi will be able to share her experiences of animals, the week we have **temple New Year Party on January 18**.

February is also very full!! **February 1** will be our **Shotsuki Service**. **February 8** will be our **Eitaikyo and Nirvana Day Service**. The Eitaikyo Service is when we honor those special temple members whose names have been entered into our Eitaikyo Registry. These members had each made significant efforts to maintain the temple as a welcoming center where the Shin Buddhist teachings can be shared with all of us. Nirvana Day is the day that Shakyamuni Buddha passed away. This service has become an annual event, when the closing service of the BCA National Council meetings will be Zoomed in to each of our temples from the meeting site. Alameda members will gather at the temple as they would each Sunday and participate in this major service along with the National Council participants in Seattle. **I will be in Seattle, waving to you all before the chanting begins!!**

So many special services and events are lined up for us to start off the year. I look forward to sharing each of these with all of you.

Raise the Roof Campaign - With Gratitude for Dāna

With deep appreciation and heartfelt gratitude, we extend our sincere thanks to everyone who practiced *dāna* in support of our Raise the Roof Campaign. Through your generosity and compassionate giving, we raised a total of **\$87,880.76**, including direct donations as well as proceeds from our **Hidden Treasures Sale** and **Fall Obento Sale**.

Use of Funds

- Roof and porch repairs: **\$67,252.00**
- Heater and air conditioning replacement: **\$25,310.00**



Guided by the collective spirit of *dāna* within our sangha, the Raise the Roof Campaign fully covered the cost of the roof replacement and porch repairs. The remaining **\$20,629** supported more than **80%** of the cost of the new furnace serving the classrooms and *hondō*, as well as the air conditioning system for the *hondō*.

This shared act of generosity helps ensure a safe, comfortable, and welcoming temple for all who enter. We are deeply grateful for your continued support and kindness.



The position of Monshu is taken by the Hongwanji Head Priest. The Jodo Shinshu tradition is transmitted through the Monshu, who leads the entire Buddhist organization as its spiritual leader.

Shinran Shonin's grandson, Nyoshin, is regarded as the second generation, thus Monshu's post has since been succeeded by Shinran Shonin's blood relatives. The present Monshu is the 25th generation, Sennyo Monshu, whose secular name is OHTANI Kojun. As Jodo Shinshu followers, we call him "Gomonshu-sama" with an honorific prefix and suffix.

New Year's Message from the Monshu Kojun Ohtani

As we welcome the new year, I wish to extend to you my greetings.

First of all, in recent years, natural disasters such as typhoons, heavy rains, earthquakes and large-scale forest fires have occurred frequently in Japan and other parts of the world, causing great damage. I would like to express my sincere condolences to those who lost loved ones and convey my sincere sympathy to everyone who was affected by these disasters. I sincerely hope that everyone will be able to return to a sense of peace and normalcy as soon as possible.

Last year was a milestone year marking 80 years since the end of World War II. In July, I had the precious opportunity to conduct memorial services in Okinawa, Hiroshima, and Nagasaki, each location which experienced indescribable destruction in this war. I was also given the precious opportunity to listen to the stories of those who experienced the war. Listening to those stories, it made me reflect on the message delivered in 1995 by then Sokunyo Monshu at the "Memorial Service for All the Victims of the 50th Anniversary of the End of the War," at which time he expressed his regret that our organization went against the teachings of our founder and actively cooperated in the war in the name of Buddhism. I was reminded that I must take to heart the words of Sokunyo Monshu and move forward carrying out my duties with a renewed determination.

The post war journey of our organization began with the aim of realizing a peaceful society where all people can live happily, while not forgetting how we actively cooperated and participated in the war. We must remain mindful of this fact and never repeat the same mistake. Even today, wars and conflicts continue around the world, and many precious lives are threatened. In such a situation, let us always keep in mind the wish of our founder, Shinran Shonin, and move forward each day guided by his words, "Let there be peace in the world, and may the Buddha Dharma spread".

2026年 年頭の辞

新しい年を迎えるにあたり、ご挨拶申し上げます。

まず、近年、日本をはじめ世界各地で台風や豪雨、地震などの自然災害や大規模な山火事などが頻繁に発生し、甚大な被害がもたらされています。犠牲となられた方々に謹んで哀悼の意を表しますとともに、被災された皆さまに心からお見舞い申し上げます。皆さまが一日も早く、平穏な日常を取り戻されますことを心から願っております。

さて、昨年は第二次世界大戦の終戦から80年という節目の年でした。私は7月に、この戦争で筆舌に尽くしがたい惨禍がもたらされた沖縄・広島・長崎の追悼法要のご縁をいただき、戦争体験者の方々のお話を聞かせていただく尊い機会を得ました。そして、平成7年・1995年の「終戦50周年全戦没者追悼法要」における、「宗祖の教えに背き、仏法の名において戦争に積極的に協力していった過去の事実を、仏祖の御前に慚愧せずにはおれません」との教団の戦争責任にかかる即如門主のお言葉を改めて心に刻み、これからも歩んでいく決意を新たにいたしました。

戦後の教団の歩みは、戦争に積極的に協力・加担した事実から目をそらさず、その反省を踏まえ、誰もが心豊かに生きられる平和な社会の実現を目指すことから始まりました。私たちは、その事実と真摯に向き合い、決して同じ過ちを繰り返してはなりません。現在も世界各地で戦争や紛争は続いており、多くの尊い命が脅かされています。そのような中であって、宗祖親鸞聖人の「世のなか安穏なれ、仏法ひろまれ」との願いを常に心に留めて、日々の歩みを進めてまいりましょう。

In February, we will hold our Eitaikyo Service & Nirvana Day Service on **February 8th at 10:00 AM**. **Eitaikyo** is a special memorial service dedicated to loved ones whose names are recorded in the Eitaikyo Registry.

The Eitaikyo Fund and Registry are common to most BCA temples and were established to help ensure the continuation of our temple and the teachings of the Nembutsu.

The Eitaikyo Registry is a calendar-style record listing those who have made donations to the fund. Through a donation to the Eitaikyo Fund, a sutra is chanted in memory of your loved one in perpetuity—on the anniversary of their passing and at our annual Eitaikyo Service.

Each temple follows its own guidelines. The suggested minimum donation is \$1,000. **Please contact Rev. Dennis for more information on how to add your loved one's name to the registry prior to our annual service on February 8th.**

Memorial Services

During memorial services, we remember the deceased with gratitude for enabling us to be who we are and to receive the *dharma*. It is a time not only to strengthen family ties, but also to reflect upon relationships beyond the immediate family, remembering and appreciating the oneness of all life.

Monthly Memorial Service (祥月法要 Shotsuki Hoyo)

Monthly Memorial Service is observed for those who died during that particular month. BTOA holds Monthly Memorial Service on the first Sunday of the month. The names of the deceased are read during this service, and family and friends of the deceased offer incense. The BTOA newsletter lists the names of the deceased for the month.

Perpetual Chanting of Sutras Memorial Service

(永代経 Eitaikyo)

Eitaikyo (perpetual or eternal – ages – sutra) is the perpetual chanting of sutras in memory of the deceased. However, "it is not that we are providing for memorial services to be held for our ancestors, but our ancestors are providing the vehicle for us to ensure the future" In other words, *Eitaikyo* can be understood to mean, 'in order that the sutra be passed on indefinitely, from generation to generation'.

Donations for Eitaikyo are put in a special fund for the temple. At BTOA, the funds are used to furnish and maintain the altar area (*onaijin*) and fund Buddhist education. The names of the deceased so remembered are entered into an Eitaikyo book which is kept on the altar. The BTOA Eitaikyo service is held in February.

Family Memorial Service (法事 Hoji)

The Family Memorial Service differs from other services in that attendance is limited to family, relatives, or friends. Arrangements are made privately with the Rev. Fujimoto, by the family.

The first three Family Memorial Services are held on or around the 7th, 49th, and 100th day after the day of death. Thereafter, services are observed near the date of death during specified years, although some families hold a Family Memorial Service every year. The 1st cycle Family Memorial Service is held on the 1-year anniversary. Subsequent services are counted Japanese style so that the 3rd cycle Family Memorial Service is held on the 2nd anniversary. The following cycles are observed: 1st, 3rd, 7th, 13th, 17th, 25th, 33rd, 50th, and 100th

Go Mei Nichi Service – This service falls on the 16th of each month (no matter what day of the week). It is held on the 16th to memorialize Shinran's death on the 16th day of January, 1263.

Shibata Thank You Bench



As we approach the seventh year memorial of Grace Shibata passing this February, we would like to highlight the bench located in our garden. It was commissioned in loving memory of the Shibata family, whose generosity to our Temple spanned many years and generations. Many of us fondly remember the annual Temple picnic held in their beautiful Japanese garden, as well as the family's generous donation that made possible the establishment of a library of Japanese Buddhist books.

Following Grace's passing in 2020, the Yoshimi and Grace Shibata Living Trust further honored their legacy with an exceptionally generous monetary gift to the Temple.

The bench was crafted by local furniture maker Lawrence Gandsey. His signature hallmark is the placement of a penny on the underside of each piece, stamped with the year it was made. Our bench features the Shibata *mon* along with two additional pennies dated 1916 and 1925—the birth years of Yoshimi and Grace Shibata. Notably, 1916 is also the year the BTOA was established. Yoshimi's parents, Zenjuro and Koyuri Shibata, were founding members of our Temple.

We are forever grateful to the Shibata family for their enduring kindness, deep gratitude, and beautiful expression of *dāna*, which continue to inspire our community.

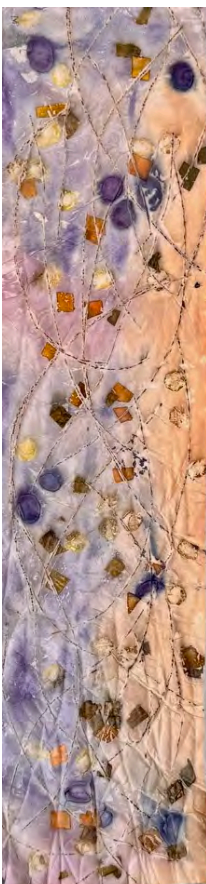
